SEA TURTLES SWIM IN TO

ESSEX COUNTY TURTLE BACK ZOO



On the evening of December 21, 2016, the zoo's newest residents – ten injured endangered sea turtles – arrived from the New England Aquarium. These turtles are temporary resident patients at the newly-opened Prudential Sea Turtle Recovery Center. The recovery center provides valuable rehabilitation space to accommodate an increasing trend in cold-stunned sea turtle strandings in the Greater Atlantic Region (from Maine to Virginia). At the Center, the Sea Turtle Recovery nurses cold-stunned, sick and injured sea turtles back to health so they can be released back into the ocean.

"The new partnership with Sea Turtle Recovery will enable Turtle Back Zoo to enhance its mission of promoting conservation and preservation, while also creating an additional space to nurture and assist the zoo's namesake animals," said Essex County Executive Joseph N.

DiVincenzo, Jr. "This project is a great example of how zoos and animal rescue organizations can work together to save animals and raise public awareness about dangers animals face," he added.

The recovery center, located on the grounds at Essex County Turtle Back Zoo and open to the public during regular business hours, is operated by the non-profit organization Sea Turtle Recovery. The organization is dedicated to the rehabilitation, preservation and conservation of sea turtles. "For over 6 years, I helped transport sea turtles that needed surgery or long-term treatments

as far as North Carolina to receive care," Co-Executive Officer Brandi Biehl said. "Now we can treat sea turtles right here in the state and provide assistance to other facilities in the Northeast that may become overcrowded," she stated.

All five species of sea turtles found in the Atlantic Ocean are threatened or endangered. This year, over 400 sea turtles have been reported as stranded in Massachusetts. As ocean water temperatures rapidly drop during the early winter months throughout the Northeast, biologists and volunteers prepare for sea turtles that are stunned by the cold, a reaction that can lead to frostbite, malnutrition, dehydration, shock, pneumonia and possibly death. Kemp's ridley, loggerhead and green sea turtles are susceptible to cold stunning when they do not head south by the time water temperatures drop.



At the zoo, an antiquated building was replaced with a modern 4,000-square-foot facility. The new building has five recovery tanks, life support systems, and an intensive care unit for more critically injured turtles. Zoo visitors are able to see less critical patients while learning about the perils sea turtles face in the wild and what the public can do to help. Once the turtles have regained their health, they will be released back into their natural habitat.



turtles," Regional Recovery Permit Coordinator Deb Carter of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service said. "Rescue, rehabilitation and release of sea turtles are not only opportunities to help populations, but also opportunities to better understand the challenges to recovering healthy populations," she said.

Essex County Turtle Back Zoo is located at the Essex County South Mountain Recreation Complex, 560 Northfield Avenue in West Orange. Kip's Castle Oral History Project

The Kip's Castle Oral History Project is an ongoing effort to stitch together the narrative of Essex County Kip's Castle Park, a gem added to the historic Essex County Parks System in 2007. The Historical Archives of the Essex County Parks System, with funding from the New Jersey Council for the Humanities and in conjunction with the Rutgers Oral History Archives, has assembled stories about Kip's Castle from the last 110 years. 



Janet Taylor Pickett: The Matisse Series Through June 18

This exhibition explores the creative dialogue between Taylor Pickett's artwork and that of renowned French artist Henri Matisse. Held in the museum's Roberts and Rotunda galleries, the exhibition features over 70 collages, many of which feature dresses. Pickett often juxtaposes images of African sculpture, textiles, and cultural elements with details from Matisse's work, typically procured from

exhibition catalogue reproductions. This multi-cultural conversation is at the heart of her complex, archetypal work, which often features portraits of the artist herself.

Matisse and American Art Through June 18

Matisse and American Art is the first exhibition to examine this French master's profound impact upon the development of American modern art from 1907 to the present. His art has provided a liberating model for American artists' varied explorations of vibrant color, strong, fluid lines, and clear compositional structures in their pursuits of self-expression. Featuring 65 paintings, archival objects, sculpture, prints, and works on paper, Matisse and American Art will juxtapose 19 works by Matisse with 44 works by American artists, including Max Weber, Alfred Maurer, Maurice Prendergast, Stuart Davis, Richard Diebenkorn, Robert Motherwell, Ellsworth Kelly, Roy Lichtenstein, Andy Warhol, Romare Bearden, John Baldessari, Sophie Matisse, and Faith Ringgold.

Inspired by Matisse: Selected Works from the Collection Through July 2018

Drawn entirely from the Montclair Art Museum's permanent collection, this show is comprised of 53 paintings, drawings, prints, and sculptures by 42 American artists. It accompanies and extends the special exhibition *Matisse and American Art*.

New Directions: Dannielle Tegeder Through Summer 2017

New Directions: Dannielle Tegeder presents newly commissioned works by the Brooklyn-based artist. The Laurie Art Stairway installation will be comprised of wall drawings and sculptural elements, and will explore how that space, with its vast glass wall facing onto both the museum grounds and the distant Manhattan skyline, melds together the inside and outside of the museum building. This installation will be complemented by two new video animations that Tegeder is creating for the video monitors on MAM's grounds.

Undaunted Spirit: Native American Art Ongoing, Permanent Collection

Undaunted Spirit: Native American Art is the final phase in MAM's major reinstallation of the Rand Gallery of Native American Art. Its overarching theme is the stylistic development of Native American art traditions and the historical contexts in which these changes were made. The final section is divided into four sections: the development of a style of Navajo weaving called "eye dazzler," the art traditions of the Great Plains, including beadwork, Northwest Coast Indian clan regalia, and contemporary artwork.

Musical Arts of Asia March 8 to February 26, 2018

Featuring more than 25 works from the museum's collection, this installation celebrates music through the arts of East and South Asia. Introducing string, percussion and wind instruments not found in Western traditions – both the actual musical instruments and images of their sounding will be featured. Prints, paintings, ivories and lacquer works from China, India, Japan, Korea, Nepal and Tibet reveal disparate dynamic melodic traditions. These visuals will be enhanced by audio and video multimedia.

Newark: City of Silver and Gold from Tiffany to Cartier Ongoing

Newark was home to a number of important silver companies and was the center of a vast gold jewelry industry. By 1900, sterling silver objects were being mass-produced at modest cost and sold through jewelry stores in every state in the country. In the same period, 14-karat gold jewelry had become a staple of modern fashion for both men and women. Newark jewelry workshops produced millions of pieces of gold jewelry annually.

American Craft: A Newark Museum Sampler Ongoing

This is a new installation focusing on American Craft of the last 30 years.

Furniture, silver, ceramics and glass objects will demonstrate the diversity of the museum's landmark holdings in American Craft. There will be masterworks by Native American and African-American artists as well as superb works by New Jersey's best-known studio craftspeople, such as Ubaldo Vitali and Paul Stankard.

When Objects Became Art Ongoing

This is a new installation that highlights the Newark Museum's century-old commitment to collecting and displaying modern ceramics and glass as art. Art ceramics purchased between 1911 and 1926 will be spotlighted, along with three examples of art glass from the 1920s. In 1910, the museum mounted an exhibition called "Modern American Pottery" and founded its decorative arts collection with examples from this display. In the 1920s, with the completion of the new museum building, more modern ceramics were purchased. The museum started buying modern glass in 1912 and added major examples purchased from a 1929 exhibition at Bamberger's Department Store called "International Ceramics and Glass" that was echoed by an installation at the museum.

Beneath Such Dreamy Moments: Joan Pamboukes Through July 31

This site-specific installation by artist Joan Pamboukes was inspired by Newark Museum's historic Ballantine House. Using common technology – iPhone and panorama app – Pamboukes investigates the effects of media and interactivity in society. Pamboukes' depiction is distorted and fragmented, making this domestic scene imaginary and fantastic. It is curated by Shlomit Dror.

Re-made Garden: Ira Wagner Through July 31

In this series "Garden State," the artist photographed industrial landscapes in New Jersey, remote from both our consciousness and body. In these carefully composed photographs, familiar objects and sceneries take on their own shape, evoking surreal impressions. Wagner's meticulous compositions convey both documentary and fictional qualities. It is curated by Shlomit Dror.

Articulations: Jaz Graf Through July 31

Jaz Graf works in experimental techniques with paper and print, most often using language as a starting point to explore personal histories, dualities, nature, human nature, and the practice of play. It is curated by Adrienne Wheeler.

Records at Play: The Institute of Jazz Studies @50 Through December 22

This exhibition is the first time the Institute of Jazz Studies at Rutgers University has exhibited so many of its treasures at once. The artifacts, documents and sound recordings in this exhibit provide a record of IJS history and the music at its core.






